Vienna's Eclipse Watch Party

The Vienna Community joined in the eclipse mania on August 21st with 160 million other people across the country. Friends and neighbors began gathering on the grassy lawn behind Vienna City Hall about 1:15 p.m. to view the much celebrated 2017 Solar Eclipse. Vienna was not in the direct path of totality but approximately 92% of the sun was blocked by the moon. The clouds cleared just in time and the effect was a beautiful site with just a sliver of the sun shining through. The temperature dropped a few degrees and daylight begin to dim as if it were twilight.

The City of Vienna provided solar glasses and moon pies for those attending the Eclipse Watch Party. South Georgia Banking Company provided iced water and fans. Everyone enjoyed sharing this historic moment with neighbors. Even a family from Kentucky traveling on Interstate 75 heard about Vienna's watch party and joined us for the occasion.

The next total solar eclipse visible over the continental United States will be April 8, 2024. Save your solar glasses and you'll be prepared.

Military Family Summit October 17, 2017






The Mission Statement of the City of Vienna






Adopt-A-Dog Month®



2017 Annual Christmas Tree Decorating Contest Rules

- 1. Either individuals or groups may decorate Christmas trees. Examples of participants may include youth groups, adult groups, civic organizations, school groups, school classes, church groups, businesses, or families. The event is limited to one entry per person or group. There is no entry fee.
- 2. Deadline to register is Friday, November 17, 2017 by 5:00 p.m.
- 3. Trees may be artificial or live. Minimum height of 4 feet and maximum height of 6 feet.
- 4. Trees must be placed in buckets filled with sand to keep them from blowing over. Keep in mind that decorations will be exposed to various weather conditions as well as birds, squirrels, and other visitors to the park.
- 5. Each participant should attach a sign no larger than 12"X 12" to identify the individual, group, organization or business who decorated the tree. The sign may be attached to the tree or the container in which the tree is placed but needs to be easily visible.
- 6. Trees can be set up in the park beginning on Thursday, November 23, 2017 and must be in place and decorated by Monday, November 27, 2017.
- 7. Flagged stakes will be placed in the City Park indicating where trees may be placed. Just pick your spot. NO DIGGING ALLOWED!!
- 8. Extension cords will be provided by the City of Vienna.
- 9. Judging will take place November 28-30, 2017.
- 10. Winners will be announced on Saturday, December 2nd at the Christmas in the Park Celebration.
- 11. Participants must remove all artificial trees and all decorations by Tuesday, January 2, 2018. Undecorated live trees may be left on the ground for the City to pick up





JOINER'S CORNER

Steve The Tool Salesman

I don't know exactly when Steve called. I think it was about 30 years ago. Jane and I were living on DeLiesseline Drive in Vienna, raising triplets. It was before caller ID. Sales calls always came right at suppertime. Most of the calls were for George, using my first name. I would know that our friendship didn't go way back. But Steve started off on the right track. He said, "Neil, this is Steve! How have you been doing buddy?" "Been doing pretty well, Steve. How about yourself?" "I'm doing great!" he said. "Thanks for asking. Neil, we talked a while back and you said to let you know when we put our tools on sale. The sale is now running and we have some terrific prices!"

I apologized and told Steve that I didn't remember talking to him about any tools, but that I sure was glad he had me on the list. Steve enthusiastically shared the details. It included all the household basics. There was a ratchet set, open-end wrenches, adjustable wrench, pliers, hammer, and several screwdrivers. All of that was just \$59.95, plus shipping and handling of \$8.89. I told Steve that sounded like a bargain and that nothing would make me happier than owning a set of quality tools. I explained to him, however, that \$59.95 was out of my price range. Steve said, "Neil, I'll tell you what I'm going to do. I'm not supposed to, but since we've been trying to get you some tools for a while now, I'm going to knock off the delivery charges."

"Steve," I said, "I wouldn't feel right about y'all having to absorb those costs. That might put a hardship on the company or even cause some problems with your job." Steve said he was good friends with his boss. He assured me that he could easily get this discount handled. I said, "Steve, we have several close neighbors on this street. I could go see them and maybe two or three would split the cost with me. If I could get two of them to go in on this deal, that would be \$20 each. I could swing that."

Steve said that was a great idea! He suggested we go ahead with the order, and that I work out the tool sharing agreement later. When he mentioned "agreement" that brought to mind we should probably have something in writing. I asked Steve if they had a legal department that could help draft such a document. He said they didn't, but he was confident that would be easy to resolve with our neighbors. I said, "Steve, what if I have an urgent need for that ratchet set the same time one of my tool sharing neighbors does? How would we handle that?" Steve didn't know. I could buy \$20 worth now, and buy the rest of them in a few months?" Steve said they couldn't do that. I asked him if there was any way he could send me a medium sized Phillip's head screwdriver. I explained that we had a swing set in the back yard with a loose screw, a situation that was interfering with our children's playtime. Steve seemed to understand the urgency of the matter.

We must have had a bad connection. It sounded like Steve was talking to someone else in the office. He was saying something about a loose screw. Then the phone went dead. I wished I had gotten his number. I would have called him back, right at suppertime.
