Vienna Historic Preservation Commission Donates History Books By Janet Joiner

The Vienna Historic Preservation Commission recently came into possession of four Georgia history books through Ex Officio Member Beth English who serves on the Georgia Historical Records Advisory Council.

A Journey of Faith and Community is the story of First Baptist Church of Augusta by Bruce T. Gourley, an historian, author, speaker, and award-winning photographer;

Restoring Lost Times by Anna Colquitt Hunter, a newspaper editor, noted artist, and early leader in Savannah's historic preservation movement;

The Weeping Time is a collection of memories of the largest slave auction in American history by Anne C. Bailey, a writer, historian, and professor of History and Africana Studies at the State University of New York; and,

200 Years of Snellville History by James W. Cofer, Jr. who was commissioned by the Snellville Historical Society to author this first complete history of the city.

All four of these books have been nominated for the Award for Excellence in Documenting Georgia's History. The Georgia Historical Records Advisory Council established the outstanding Archives Awards Program in 2003 to recognize outstanding efforts in archives and records work in Georgia. By publicly recognizing excellent achievements, the Board strives to inspire others. The winner of this award will be announced in October.

The Vienna Historic Preservation Commission who supports the preservation of local, state, and national history has donated these books to the Dooly County Library.






Phase II Downtown Sidewalk/Streetscape Project

Phase II of Vienna's Downtown Sidewalk/Streetscape Improvement Project is complete except for planting trees in the cutouts. The Georgia Department of Transportation's planting period for street trees is November through January. The City is planning to plant in November.

The sidewalk improvements enhance accessibility, make downtown more pedestrian friendly, and enrich the aesthetics of Vienna's historic downtown. Improvements made to portions of North 3rd Street and South 3rd Street consisted of new curb and gutter, new concrete walks with the stamped brick design to match other areas of downtown, 8 new pedestrian street lamps, and landscaping. The new areas also are handicap accessible and conform to the provisions of the American with Disabilities Act (ADA).

The project was funded with a Transportation Enhancement Grant awarded by the Georgia Department of Transportation. City officials wish to thank you for your patience during this time of inconvenience.



First Stakeholder Exchange Meeting of New School Year

The first meeting of the Dooly County Schools Stakeholder Exchange was held August 28, 2018. The participants were welcomed by Ms. Jean Thompson, Executive Director of Curriculum and Interim Superintendent. She shared with the group the good news that the school system acquired a GG4 Literacy Grant and this year would see the beginning stages of the grant plan introduced to the Dooly County community with training and workshops.

A new supportive and positive behavior program will be implemented in all the schools, Positive Behavior Intervention. This program will hopefully support students in focusing their efforts on their school work while enjoying the benefits of the many experiences students share while attending school. To support the new behavior plans, the system adopted the 7 Mindsets Program that was developed to assist students in the process of learning how to work with others, build supportive teams around them, and help them develop skills to achieve their goals and dreams for the future. Thompson thanked all the Stakeholders for their work over the last two years and the school system appreciates all efforts on its behalf.

DCHS principal, Mr. Timothy White, shared his vision for the school that will focus on academic achievement, building school pride, supporting all College & Career Programs, and providing our young people with all the support needed to build a foundation to support their life goals. He was followed by Ms. Sharron Marcus, Dooly County K-8 Academy Principal, who explained the REACH Scholarship to the attendees.

The REACH Scholarship provides Dooly County 8th graders up to \$20,000 in scholarship support to attend college. Once students meet the criteria in middle school and they travel to the high school, they receive additional support from assigned mentors who will track their progress through school until graduation. Ms. Marcus has already achieved half of her fundraising goal, but has more to do to ensure that we are able to support a maximum of five students per year. If you would like to assist in the worthy goal to support Dooly County potential, please contact Ms. Marcus at the DCS K-8 Academy. Donations as well as ideas are welcome.

The Stakeholder team members broke into their small group brainstorming sessions to share and discuss ideas and plans to assist schools in achieving their goals. A review of the work was shared via a short video highlighting the great work of the Stakeholder Exchange. We are all looking forward to a successful 2018-2019 effort with the support of our committed Stakeholders.



Joiner's Corner A Flat Tire Memory

Jane and I were on Highway 27 in late December of 2017, headed from Americus to our home near Vienna. We drove past an abandoned white frame house in rural Sumter County. It's been vacant for years and is long past the point of being repairable.

Jane was using her cellphone, so I didn't mention that the old house and I have a history together. It's nothing significant, just a minor event that somehow found a permanent home in my memory.

I think I was in the ninth or tenth grade, but I'm not sure. Several guys from our Future Farmers of America chapter in Unadilla were on a trip to Americus. Mr. Ottis Beard, our advisor and ag teacher, was driving his blue Ford pickup. He had the side bodies on and was hauling our purebred barrows to Americus for a district competition.

A truck tire went flat, and we pulled over near that farmhouse. Flats were rather common in those days. This flat was surrounded by some energetic farm boys, so it quickly surrendered. When Jane and I drove by that old house, I was reminded of that flat tire, and of the barrow show that day.

I don't remember the name of my barrow. I'll just call him Bocephus, because that seems like a good name for a high caliber hog. I felt that Bocephus had a good chance at winning one of the three ribbons to be awarded. He carried himself with a confidence that is not often found among swine.

To develop his muscle tone, I had taken him on daily walks of 30 minutes. Bocephus, like some of my other show hogs, enjoyed the time we spent together. It didn't cross my mind that his friendly demeanor might one day be a source of embarrassment.

There were about 20 barrows in the show ring, hailing from several middle Georgia counties. We handled our pigs like showmen at the circus, always watching the judge and trying to attract his attention, constantly seeking to obtain eye contact, just as we had been taught.

Those hogs made multiple trips trotting around that ring, all of them following some pig who had by default assumed a leadership role. They ran quickly back and forth from one end to the other, all of them packed neatly into an inseparable group, all of them except for Bocephus.

Despite my frantic pleas, Bocephus refused to act like a normal hog. I had a big walking stick that Grandaddy Hill had given me. I wanted to whack Bocephus hard enough to get his attention and make him conform, but I'd never done that at home and figured I shouldn't start now.

I knew that Bocephus would soon be leaving on a different truck than he came in on. It didn't seem right that we should part on bad terms. So, with a face as flushed as my spirit, I tapped him lightly, just like I had at home. We walked slowly around the ring, taking whatever path Bocephus chose.

The judge called out the third, second, and first place winners. I wasn't surprised that Bocephus didn't place, and I knew that my poor presentation was partly to blame. Even worse, the two of us were still not part of the group, but were instead standing conspicuously alone.

The judge announced that there was a final award he would present, the award for showmanship. He said there was only one person in the ring who maintained control of his barrow the entire time, whose hog remained separate from the group and could be clearly seen. He shook my hand and handed me a new walking stick made from white oak and polished to a high gloss finish.

I knew that Bocephus deserved the award more than me, but he never was good at grasping things with his feet. I kept that walking stick for years, but lost track of it somewhere along the line.

The late Reverend Doug Fullington shared something with me a long time ago that his grandfather had told him. He said, "If you always follow the crowd, the crowd will never follow you." I think that's the same lesson that Bocephus tried to teach me that day in Americus. Good lessons can come from unlikely sources if we're willing to learn.

I'm glad that flat tire memory and that old house still remind me of Bocephus, because Bocephus reminds me that following the crowd is often not the best road to take. Lonesome roads can lead to rich rewards. I sure wish I could find that walking stick.


Please do not mix trash with your limbs/yard waste. Do NOT pile limbs near power lines, power poles or fences.

Tips for reducing, recycling, and disposing of hazardous materials: Lawn Care

- Use electric-powered lawn equipment instead of gaspowered whenever possible.
- Since it's easy to create leftovers by overestimating the gasoline necessary for a mowing season, plan to make a second purchase of a lesser amount to finish the season.
- Help fertilize your lawn by mowing 1/3 of the total grass height only and leaving the clippings on the lawn (mulching mowers and mowers with sharp blades work best).
- Use pesticides and herbicides sparingly and only when all else fails.
